

Our Daily (...fill in the blank)

Give us this day our daily bread. - Matthew 6:11 (NRSV)

I've prayed the Lord's Prayer since childhood. When the pandemic started five years ago, the prayer took on a deeper meaning, especially the line about daily bread. When the world shut down, I learned time and again how many people—farmers and farmworkers, truck drivers and plant workers, the people who harvested the grain and those who stocked the grocery stores—made that daily bread possible.

The pandemic also reminded me of a friend's wisdom about praying the Lord's Prayer in a 12-step meeting. "When we ask for 'our daily bread,'" he said, "you hear people pray for all kinds of things—daily courage, daily strength, daily guidance." The pandemic's long months of constant pivots shrank my usual long-range planning prayers to those deep daily prayers for whatever courage or wisdom I—or the church I serve—needed to get to the next day.

Sometimes the prayer for daily bread took on other tangible forms. I prayed for daily sunrises, daily walks, or a daily check-in with a colleague or friend, anything to remind me of beauty and life. As the author Barbara Kingsolver wrote of her "worst seasons," she forced herself "to look hard, for a long time, at a single glorious thing: a flame of red geranium outside my bedroom window ... my daughter in a yellow dress ... the perfect outline of a full, dark sphere behind the crescent moon. Until I learned to be in love with life again."

SEARCH UPDATE:



LENT-History and Traditions

The word Lent comes form the Anglo-Saxon word that means "spring" or "springtime".

Taken literally, the word means that this is the time of the year when the days *lengthen*.

This season of the church year is a time of reparation, reflection, growth, and change.



As God's people take the time to learn more about God and their relationship to God and to others, the season before Easter can be seen as the springtime of the soulatime of growth in faith and a time to nurture the faith that is already theirs.

The Christian faith centers around the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

We need to see this event from both sides – before and after--because each side if the story is incomplete without the other.

The season of Lent began in the early church as a time for preparing new converts for Baptism of Easter. By the middle of the fourth century, a 40- day preparation period had been established. During that time, candidates for Baptism fasted and heard lectures from early church leaders. Later, the season of Lent became a time for all Christian as to prepare for Easter. It remains a 40-day long period, not counting Sundays. Historically the Lenten fasts were lessened on Sundays, thus not included in the days of Lent. All Sundays are considered "little Easters," celebrating the resurrection. The season of Lent begins for many people on Shrove Tuesday, but it officially begins on Ash Wednesday and continues until Easter morning.

By the year AD 400 the early Christian church had established this period of 40 days. It became a time of self-discipline and harsh self-examination, and during the Middle Ages, the season of Lent was so strict that people dreaded its coming. Through time the harsh demands and expectations have been softened and relaxed.

People today look to Lent as a time of growth and change. They often include fasting or restriction of some of their favorite foods or drinks during the 40 days of Lent. Some people spend more time in prayer and meditation while others give up habits they think are unnecessary. Still others search to discover how they can share God's love with others in the world in meaningful ways.

Purple is the color associated with the season of Lent and is used in churches that observe liturgical traditions. Purple is a solemn color, reminiscent of royalty and repentance. It reflects the serious and somber nature of this time in the life of the church.



Christian Action has chosen Shannondale Ministries as the recipient of our special offering this Lent. Shannondale is a UCC mission and retreat center, a church and community center as well as a 4,040 acre tree farm with an active university forestry education program.

Right now the community has been suffering from the extremely cold winter and have urgent needs.
